THE CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE REMARKS

Over the last 12 months Praxis Care has increased its services by winning a number of significant new contracts including services in England and in the Republic of Ireland.

Turnover has increased over the year by 8% when other charities on average are experiencing decreases in income.

The organisation has continued to strive to deliver excellent services which provide positive outcomes for the people who use Praxis Care services. Audit systems and continuous improvement processes have been developed and implemented to provide an evidence base for quality.

At the centre of delivering these services is a loyal and committed staff group and volunteers who often go the 'extra mile' in helping to transform the lives of service users. The annual staff awards ceremony seeks to recognise examples of excellence within the organisation and recognition of achievements.

The incoming year will bring uncertainty for the Voluntary Sector with public spending retraction but Praxis Care is confident in being fit for purpose and ready to face future challenges.

The last 12 months have witnessed a number of significant changes at a national and local level.

The changes in government have heralded a new era of partnership working and a desire to deliver on the vision of a "Big Society". Retraction of public spending will require service providers to reshape services to produce savings while continuing to ensure that the quality of services are maintained and improved.

Praxis Care will rise to the challenge of the "Big Society" as the organisation believes it can match these new requirements. Praxis Care can demonstrate that it can provide excellent, innovative services while delivering up to 30 per cent saving to the public purse.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS - April 2009/March 2010

New developments and services commencing 2009/10

Bury, England - May 2009

A major contract was won to provide a floating support service for people with substance misuse issues in Bury, Greater Manchester.

Trafford, England - December 2009

Praxis Care secured a tender for the provision of residential care for 19 service users with learning disabilities residing in three homes in Trafford Borough Council.

Brookvale, the Republic of Ireland - February 2010

Praxis Care won a significant contract for an 8 bedded residential home in Brookvale, Monaghan for people with learning disabilities and complex needs. The Health Service Executive (HSE) needed the service to be established quickly to accommodate individuals moving out of hospital. Praxis Care had the scheme up and running within 3 months.

Donabate, the Republic of Ireland - March 2010

A new service was implemented for 3 service users with learning disabilities and complex needs in Donabate, North East Dublin.





Joan and Jim Baird, Residents at Praxis Care's St Paul's Court Dementia Accommodation and Support Scheme

Jim says: "Joan and I are 19 years retired. I used to work as a civil servant and Joan worked in a local factory in Lisburn. We have lived all our lives in Lisburn. After an angina attack, six years ago, Joan had to go to hospital and at that time was diagnosed with dementia.

Whilst in hospital it was recommended that she should go into a nursing home. However my family and I were very keen that Joan return home. She returned to our home and was looked after by my family and myself along with local carers. After a case conference it was recommended that Joan should move into a home on a permanent basis.

My son had heard of St Paul's Court and he recommended that we should consider moving in. After a visit we agreed to move in as a couple and we have been in St Paul's now for two years and have settled in well. Joan has a carer who comes in every morning. This is really important as it gives me a chance to go for a walk and get some exercise.

During the day we can come and go as we please and every evening Joan calls over to the main centre for the supper club. Also once a week a carer comes in to look after Joan and I can go out to play some snooker.

We would love to stay living in our own home but the nature of the dementia means Joan requires day to day support. More than anything else what St Paul's offers is peace of mind for me and my family. They know that Joan and I are living in a safe and supported home"

At the awards ceremony, staff were recognised for going the extra mile above and beyond their normal job responsibilities.



Befriending awards

The Praxis Care Befriending Scheme operates throughout Northern Ireland and in the Isle of Man. Schemes are located in Belfast, Foyle, North Down and Ards, Antrim, Magherafelt, Cookstown, Lurgan and Isle of Man.

The scheme matches volunteers with people who are suffering from or are in danger of developing mental ill health as well as people with learning disabilities.

The Praxis Care annual befriending awards event provides a forum to recognise the valuable support given by volunteers.

SERVICE USERS' SURVEY

Every 2 years Praxis Care carries out a survey of service users' and carers' views on the services provided by Praxis Care. Individuals are asked how happy they are with the service they receive from Praxis Care and make suggestions for improvement.

The survey "Views from Users" 2008 was published in 2009. The overall response rate across the organisation was 58%. The responses from the survey indicated that:

- 96% were happy with the services provided to them;
- 96% believed that their quality of life had improved as a result of using the services;
- 97% would recommend Praxis Care to others in need of similar help.

The strategy will enable the organisation to utilise effective and appropriate information technology to manage and monitor the implementation of the service standards under the Quality Management review.

The new systems will be rolled out over the next three years and will allow the organisation to manage its resources better, thereby improving support to service users.
